

MOUNTAIN RESOURCE CENTER







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Mountain Resource Center is a vital resource along the 285 Corridor. We provide a Food Share Market, emergency housing and utility assistance, health and wellness classes, workforce services, veterans' services, case management, and wraparound services to mountain communities across two large counties. This fiscal year, we have also worked toward opening a high-quality half-day preschool program, one of the only half-day programs in the area, fulfilling the promise of universal pre-K in our area. We are proud to announce that our preschool is fully operational and serving children and their families as of August 19th, 2024.

Need in our mountain communities is often masked by high property values. Still, over the past year, 88% (1,165 households) of those we served were at or below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL), which in 2024 is only \$15,060 in annual income for a single person, and \$31,200 for a family of four. Our services are a lifeline for our mountain families, and we are focused not only on helping people make ends meet but also assisting individuals and families to find the tools and resilience to gain independence.

Our Food Share Market and Mobile Food Share programs distributed **310,361 pounds** of food during this fiscal year, and we provided **\$210,128 in urgently needed housing** and utility assistance. We also provided **1,600 case management services to 379** people and ultimately served **1,308 households, including 736 children**.



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### A LETTER FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

Dear Clients, Partners, and Community Supporters,

As I reflect on the past year at Mountain Resource Center, I'm reminded not only of our continued commitment to the many programs we've established over the years to support our clients but also of some important changes. The first significant change was the closure of the Resale Store. While the decision to close the store was a difficult one, it was made easier by the hard work and dedication of MRC staff and volunteers. The ownership of the store has since been transferred to a new agency, Community Nest.

Another significant change was the launch of our fully licensed preschool. After navigating the extensive process of obtaining permits and meeting licensing requirements, we proudly opened the school in August 2024. The response from parents has been overwhelmingly positive, particularly given the free education we offer. Looking ahead, we anticipate that the preschool will have a major impact on the community, especially since there are few alternative options in the Conifer area.



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As we prepared for preschool, Mountain Resource Center's Family Education program supported **69 households and 129 individuals**, providing impactful services primarily through our Incredible Years and Circle of Parents programs and the second year of our summer camp program.

> Incredible Years, a curriculum tailored for parents with young children, was a cornerstone of our offerings. While parents attend sessions, children engage in a specialized, in-house curriculum focused on building essential skills.

> > One resounding success this year was our summer camp program. We were able to provide local families with a one-week free summer camp opportunity, and served many families who would not otherwise be able to afford this kind of programming.

In just the one week of camp, our students made distinct gains in the areas of persistence, selfcontrol, and social competence. Our feedback from parents and students was excellent, and many families have remained connected to our services. Children who have been read one book a day will hear approximately 290,000 more words by age five than kids who have not been read to.

We are so grateful to the families who have entrusted their kiddos to us. This year, our Community Health program delivered **11,040 services**, with a large focus on our Food Share Market and Mobile Food Share initiatives, **providing 310,361 pounds of food to 1,023 households**. But at Mountain Resource Center, we go beyond food assistance. Through a comprehensive food systems approach, supported by grant funding, we bolster local farmers and ranchers while building community.

In partnership with the local community garden, we distributed fresh greens and herbs, while our pantry program supported 20-30 local farmers, helping keep economic resources within our community. Local ranchers contributed responsibly sourced meat, providing our clients with essential protein.

Our programs include educational content on nutrition, wellness, and budgeting to support individuals and strengthen the community as a whole.

There have even been two of our Culinary Adventures classes taught completely in Spanish by some of our clients (and translated into English by one of our bilingual staff members), including a class on making handmade tortillas. These classes wear down cultural tension or simple cultural awkwardness, planting seeds of greater understanding and a sense of belonging.

> After our February Culinary Adventures classes, **85%** of participants reported that it increased their sense of belonging in the community.



## VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Pantry Outreach

The vital work of Mountain Resource Center would not be possible without the dedication and generosity of our volunteers! This year, our volunteers contributed an impressive **8,551** hours, valued at **\$287,228**, based on the 2024 estimated value of a volunteer hour, as determined by Maryland's Do Good Institute.

We also took important steps to streamline our volunteer program by implementing an automated training system. Additionally, feedback from a volunteer survey guided us in identifying training needs and enhancing support to ensure the highest quality of service delivery.

Our volunteers' commitment enables us to continue serving our community with excellence —thank you to each and every volunteer!



This year, 149 volunteers donated 8,551.2 hours of their time to MRC.

#### VETERANS' SERVICES

In the 2023/24 fiscal year, MRC supported 145 veteran households with essential assistance tailored to their unique needs. Beyond providing rent, mortgage, and utility assistance, our grant from Disabled American Veterans (DAV) enabled us to address a variety of specific and urgent needs, including:

- Covering three months of medication expenses
- Assisting with dental bills
- Funding car repairs and new tires
- Pumping a septic system

- Making electrical repairs
- Supplying firewood and propane
- Handling plumbing repairs and installing a water filter
- Providing access to therapy sessions

Through these comprehensive services, we ensured that veterans and their families received the support they needed for a safe, stable, and healthy life.



#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In 2023/2024, MRC strengthened its community connections by attending local events, including the **Evergreen Rodeo and** Conifer's Elevation Celebration, and by hosting a Community Café and a Veterans' Café. Through these efforts and interactions within our facilities, we provided 923 referrals to connect community members with our services and additional resources.

Our school supply drive helped **124 students** begin the school year



equipped with essential supplies. These students' families earned, on average, less than 90% of the federal poverty level, and this support was essential to ensure a positive start to their school year. Additionally, MRC provided **270 households with \$23,487 in gift cards** to support holiday needs and urgent financial assistance.

This year's outreach has been a testament to our commitment to fostering resilience and supporting families across our community.

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#### CASE MANAGEMENT

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This year, MRC's case management program served 379 individuals with 1,626 tailored services aimed at building independence and resilience. By helping clients address housing, healthcare, financial stability, and employment needs, our case managers empower people to overcome obstacles and thrive in our community. This personalized support is central to MRC's mission, fostering lasting change and a pathway to independence and thriving.

#### RENT/MORTGAGE, UTILITY, AND TRANSPORTATION ASSISTANCE

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This year, MRC provided vital support to help families avoid homelessness, stay warm, and keep their lights on. We assisted with **\$65,386 in rent and mortgage aid and \$126,415 for utility expenses**, ensuring stability and security for households in need. In our mountain communities, where public transit is scarce, we invested **\$6,796 in transportation assistance**, enabling residents to reach essential locations, like doctor's offices, grocery stores, and places of employment. Through these efforts, MRC helped hundreds of households build stability and self-sufficiency.

#### WORKFORCE

The Workforce Program offers crucial support to community members with services like resume development, interview preparation, job search assistance, and more. This year, the program provided services to 28 individuals, averaging 7 services per person. This program also includes the Job Training Program (JTP), which provides Associates with a 24-week on-the-job training program designed to build work experience and provide coaching and hands-on instruction. During the 2023/2024 fiscal year, we had four Job Training Associates participate in the program, all of whom successfully completed it. Additionally, all JTP Associates reported increased confidence in their computer and communication skills, highlighting the positive impact of this experience. One participant was even successfully hired as a receptionist at Mountain Resource Center.





#### LORI'S STORY

"A year ago, I was sitting at home feeling sorry for myself. I had lost my husband, had not worked for 30 years and was finding it difficult to keep up with rising prices. My daughter saw the ad for a Job Training Associate on FB and sent me the info. I applied and was delighted to be accepted into the program. I worked in the Resale Store, the Food Pantry, the front desk, and spent time updating my computer skills. I found that the variety of tasks helped me to whittle down the types of jobs that interested me. I felt more self-confident, enjoyed helping people, and was so grateful for the opportunity to get back into the workforce. At the end of the program, I was lucky enough to be able to apply for an open position at MRC. I have been 18 working here since July and loved every minute of it." - Lori Christenson
